Dear Members,

In 1849, French writer Jean-Baptiste Alphonse Karr wrote 'the more things change, the more they stay the same'. As you will read, the subbranch is now in possession of copies of our first DON Rs from March 1947 to March 1953. As I went to write this opening it occurred to me that the Toowong Secretary continually makes the same opening comments:

- Welcome to new members. In 1947, however, membership had soared to 1120 following demobilisation. In 2024, we have 102 Service and Veterans up from 94 last year and 93 in 2022. We are also very happy to have in 2024, 28 social members from the community.
- Congratulations on ANZAC Day. In 1947, 200 to 300 people gathered at the Memorial at 8am. In 2024 we had over 1500 people at 6am. A big thank you goes to Steve Thornton for all the effort that went into coordinating this year's ANZAC Dawn Service and this DON R.
- Thank you for fundraising. In 1947, the Secretary commented that they only raised £8 from ANZAC day badge sales (approx. \$645); compared to \$4719 in 2024. Thank you to all the volunteers who helped our fundraising efforts at the hospitals and at Toowong Village.
- Upcoming Events. In 1947, members

were encouraged to participate in weekly dances, card nights, garden parties, baby contests and the Xmas Tree. In 2024, we have events planned leading up to Christmas, including a Children's Christmas Party on the West Rugby's oval. We do hope that our members embrace the opportunities to meet and socialise with their fellow members.

The more things change, the more they stay the same; but equally like in 1947, the Secretary sees a bright future ahead.

## **Bridge of Friendship**

The Bridge of Friendship between Australia and France, is dedicated to every Australian Army engineer unit involved in World War One.

<u>Amiens France</u> – This bridge was dedicated on 24<sup>th</sup> April 2024 and is a "twin" bridge to that located in ANZAC Park, Toowong.

These monuments/bridges will serve as a perpetual link between Australia and France in recognition of the outstanding achievements of the members of RAE during WWI in every area in which they served.

Thanks to the hard work of George Hulse and the 1<sup>st</sup> Field Squadron Association in facilitating both bridges. Thirteen members of the Toowong Sub Branch attended the dedication in France.

The Amiens bridge has on one side of the walkway Australian motifs including the RAE Bursting Bomb with the words "Follow the Sapper" beneath the bomb and a kangaroo in a corner of each of the panels. On the other side, is the heraldic symbol of the French Army engineer accompanied by the Unicorn of Amiens.

On the Australian side of the bridge, on the central panel, are the words in the English language "The Bridge of Friendship between Australia and France, dedicated to every Australian Army engineer unit involved in World War One" and the same words but in the French language on the panel opposite.

Purpose of the bridge (In English and French) Gates showing the Unicorn and Kangaroo

The bridge was assembled by a group of seven Sapeurs from the 3<sup>rd</sup> Regiment du Genie under the control of George Hulse.

The dignitaries who inaugurated the bridge by cutting the opening ribbon include Monsieur Rollon Mouchel-Blasiot (Prefet of the Somme), Monsieur Alain Gest (member French National Assembly) and Minister Matt Keogh MP (Minister for Veterans Affairs).

There was an exchange of National Flags between a student from an Amiens school and a student from St Joseph's (Stanthorpe).

The highlight of the ceremony occurred after the exchange of flags when the first people to cross the bridge were a large contingent of school students from St Joseph's School in Stanthorpe. They were piped across the bridge by a lone bagpiper with each student waving a small Australian flag. The bridge was blessed by a priest who led those gathered in prayer to sanctify the work of the military engineer.

Brisbane choir (Chantefique) and the Amiens choir (Diapason) joined in singing the National Anthems.

The reception that followed the bridge dedication was held in a large marquee close to the bridge site on the Botanical Gardens side of the Somme River. Chantefique entertained everyone with French and English songs from WWI. 1<sup>st</sup> Field Squadron Association awarded Certificates of Appreciation to their French friends and enjoyed the hospitality of the Amiens City Council.

The bridges in Toowong and Amiens France were financed by a combination of an RAE Foundation donation together with a donation from the Toowong Sub Branch and crowd funding by the 1<sup>st</sup> Field Squadron Association.

**Toowong Brisbane** - This bridge was dedicated on 11<sup>th</sup> November 2022 to coincide with the 120<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of the Corps of Royal Australian Engineers. It is a genuine Bailey military grade pedestrian bridge of 5 bays.

# Centenary of Stone of Remembrance and Cross of Sacrifice

On 5<sup>Th</sup> April 2024, the Toowong RSL arranged a service to mark the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Stone of Remembrance and the Cross of Sacrifice at the Toowong Cemetery.

His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd) and her Excellency Mrs Linda Hurley attended the service.

Thanks goes to Tim Robb for coordinating the service and a special acknowledgement to Sarah Harper who completed all the hard work in getting all the background approvals and who facilitated the rejuvenation of the memorials and the garden areas surrounding them.

Darcy Maddock (Friends of Toowong Cemetery) and Peter Collins (Canon Garland Memorial & Stone of Remembrance Centenary Committee) coordinated the event. The Governor General wrote a letter acknowledging the work of the Toowong RSL and SED.

#### **Corporal William Darby**

CPL William Darby was the model for the figure of this soldier on the Cenotaph in Martin Place, Sydney. William landed at Gallipoli on his 43<sup>rd</sup> birthday on 25<sup>th</sup> April 1915. He was previously buried in an unmarked grave at Toowong Cemetery. Toowong RSL arranged a headstone for him, and a gravesite dedication service was held on Remembrance Day 2023.

#### DON R - March 1947 to Mar 1953

The Toowong RSL was recently donated two bound copies of our original DON Rs by the granddaughter of Sidney (Bom) Stubington. Sidney was an editor of the DON R. Sidney's granddaughter, Clara Greo, currently lives in Brighton, UK and we thank her sincerely.



We will have the monthly newsletters scanned so we can preserve this part of our history. In future DON R editions, we will include snippets from our past including how proud the sub-branch was of their stand at the Exhibition and the ongoing trials and tribulations of our sub-branch in the post war years.

SGT Sidney Stubington served in 1st Garrison Battalion from 1939 to 1944. After leaving the Army he joined Toowong RSL, later becoming Editor from June 1947 of the monthly DON R magazine (that was sold for approx. \$1.00).

#### Sapper George Hook

While in France in April 2024, the RAE Associations, members of the 1<sup>st</sup> Field Squadron and members of the Toowong RSL participated in a rededication service on 24<sup>th</sup> April 2024 for a new headstone for Sapper George Hook. George's headstone was unveiled by LCPL Raeme Brooke from 1 Field Squadron (LCPL Brooke was nominated as the top Sapper in 1 FD SQN in 2023) and she represented the unit at the bridge dedication ceremony as well as the Dawn Service at the Australian Monument to WWI near the township of Villers-Bretonneux.

Sapper Hook was accompanying his officer, 2LT Ralph Hunt, on a reconnaissance patrol along the Somme River on 8 August 1918 near the townships of Cerisy and Chipilly. They were engaged by a German machine gun which seriously wounded Sapper Hook in the legs. LT Hunt, with total disregard for his own life, ran to his soldier's aid, lifted him on to his shoulders and ran with enemy bullets flicking up earth around him. The LT survived but George Hook was hit again by enemy fire. When George was dropped off at a Casualty Clearing Station, he did not have any identification devices with him and when he died of wounds, he was buried in an unknown soldier's grave.

A long search for him ended in 2023 when he was found and identified in the British WWI cemetery in the township of Vignacourt – about a 20-minute drive from Amiens.

The Department of Veterans Affairs financed a headstone rededication service for George on 24<sup>th</sup> April 2024 and his descendants were invited to attend the service. A large contingent from RAE Associations and the Toowong RSL sub-branch attended. The band of the RAAF and a Catafalque party were deployed to the unveiling.

It is interesting that 2LT Ralph Hunt was nominated by his OC for the Victoria Cross, but this was downgraded to the Distinguished Service Order by the General Officer Commanding the British 4<sup>th</sup> Army, General Henry Rawlinson.

#### Last Post

John Muirhead passed away in May aged 93. We offer our condolences to Mike and the Muirhead family.



A reminder that the sub-branch will conduct a poppy service for any person who has served in the Australian Defence Force. They do not have to have been a member of the RSL. They are free of charge.

An RSL representative will:

- deliver a eulogy, detailing the veteran's service
- recite The Ode
- sound *The Last Post* and *Rouse*
- provide poppies for mourners to place on the coffin in recognition of service.

Unfortunately, we are often advised of the passing of a member by family sometime after the funeral so please make your family aware of the poppy service if it is something you would like to be part of your service.

#### **RSL Queensland Advocates**

RSL Queensland employs about 90 paid and some unpaid advocates to support veterans in Queensland and the Northern Territory. The number of paid advocates is increasing as the accreditation requirements increases.

They operate a triage system to support the more urgent cases first. Currently there is a wait of between 30-90 days to get an interview with an advocate. Outside of that, urgent support for homelessness or financial support, etc. is available.

Open Arms provides mental health support for Navy, Army and Air Force personnel, veterans & their families.

They have a 24hr crisis support line as well as free and confidential counselling to partners and children of those who have served. You can call 24/7 on 1800 011 046. More information at <u>www.openarms.gov.au</u>.

Mates 4 Mates supports their members with psychological, physical and social barriers services.

To find out more about joining Mates4Mates, accessing services or supporting our cause, fill out the form or call 1300 4 MATES (62 837) during business hours. More information at <u>www.mates4mates.org</u>.

If you feel the need for an advocate to make an initial contact for advocacy support, contact RSL Queensland in 134 775 and choose option 2 to go through to a staff member. They will interview you and get your details. You will then receive an email to read and agree to the Client Services Agreement.

Once you accept this you will receive a second email to complete your:

- Profile Information,
- Living Conditions, and
- Personal Wellbeing Index

Based on your answers you will get another email with useful links such as Open Arms, Mates for Mates, etc.

We encourage all members who may have current or future needs to consider an early approach as the DVA assessment process can be drawn out. Your Regimental Number and/or PMKeys number will be required so have it handy.

Even better your DVA White Card is useful as this has your DVA reference number even if you have only the basic services on it.

#### Welfare Assistance

Occasionally we are contacted by other subbranches and ex-service men and women to assist with advocacy regarding the



Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) and other agencies. In these cases, we can direct them to the appropriate contact within the RSL.

RSL South Eastern District offers free services for veterans & families:

- Wellbeing support, visits & bereavement assistance
- Medical & allied health referrals
- PTSD & mental health support
- Advocacy & research for compensation & welfare
- Career transition assistance



#### Commemorative Ceremony — Centenary of The Stone of Remembrance Toowong Cemetery, Saturday 20<sup>th</sup> April 2024

It is a privilege for me to send you this message on such an historic and significant occasion.

Historic because 100 years ago then Governor-General Lord Forster officiated at the unveiling and dedication of Australia's first national war memorials.

Significant because since then The Stone of Remembrance and The Cross of Sacrifice have provided a place of remembrance for not only our diggers who landed at Anzac Cove but those who served in the Second World War, in Korea, Vietnam, on peacekeeping operations around the world, and more recently in Iraq and Afghanistan.

That is why you are all here.

And in honouring our service men and women, we recognise the impact of that service on their families.

Many, many times over the years and in varying capacities, I have been asked why memorials and commemorative services are important.

Because they inform who we are and who we aspire to be.

Our nation must never forget the sacrifices made by our service men and women and the contribution they have made to our country.

We remember them and will never forget them.

We also take inspiration from them.

Moreover, in remembering those who have served, we are learning and thinking about who we are as Australians, what we stand for, how we go about life and what our values are. The actions of our veterans and current serving ADF men and women reflect values we attribute to the Anzac legacy: courage, sacrifice, endurance and mateship.

As a nation, we've seen examples of this legacy in the way we have responded to flood, fire, drought, cyclones and the pandemic.

As I approach my last Anzac Day address as Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief, I want to assure our serving personnel that we respect their service.

They should be proud of the uniform they wear. They are rightful inheritors and protectors of the Anzac legacy. We are proud of them.

Today commemorative ceremony is special for another reason. It is the centenary of the first Anzac service conducted in Australia in the format we know today.

Canon David Garland, an Anglican priest, had witnessed the Anzacs at war in Western Europe. He understood the legacy that they were creating and tried to capture it at that first service here at Toowong Cemetery. Poignantly, that service ended with the familiar words 'Lest we forget.'

I commend all members and supporters of The Stone of Remembrance Centenary Committee, particularly the Friends of Toowong Cemetery, Toowong RSL Sub-Branch and RSL South-Eastern District.

Lest we forget.
